Brian Lara (West Indies) – 9 Double Centuries

A genius with the bat, **Brian Lara** had a flair for the spectacular. With **9 double centuries**, including the only 400* in Test cricket, Lara redefined batting with his fearless and fluent strokeplay.

His 375 against England stood as the highest individual Test score for a decade until he reclaimed the record with 400*. Lara's double hundreds were usually filled with artistic cover drives and bold stroke-making, captivating fans around the globe.

Wally Hammond (England) – 7 Double Centuries

Wally Hammond, one of England's greatest-ever cricketers, scored **7 double centuries** in the early days of Test cricket. He played 85 Tests and ended his career with 7,249 runs, a staggering feat for his era.

Hammond was known for his powerful drives and elegant footwork. His most famous knock was the 336* against New Zealand in 1933, a record that stood for many years.

Virat Kohli (India) – 7 Double Centuries

Modern-day legend **Virat Kohli** has **7 double centuries in Test cricket**, the most by any Indian batter. Known for his hunger for big scores and supreme fitness, Kohli dominated the red-ball format, especially during 2016–2019.

His 254* against South Africa in Pune remains his highest score. What makes Kohli's double centuries special is that most of them came in match-winning situations, reflecting his ability to lead from the front.

Mahela Jayawardene (Sri Lanka) – 7 Double Centuries

Another Sri Lankan legend, **Mahela Jayawardene**, joins the elite list with **7 double centuries**. A calm and graceful player, Jayawardene's high scores often came in partnership with Sangakkara, building massive totals for Sri Lanka.

His standout performance remains the 374 against South Africa in 2006—still the highest individual Test score by a Sri Lankan.

- **Younis Khan (Pakistan)** – 6 double centuries
- **Ricky Ponting (Australia)** – 6 double hundreds
